

David Hock on Delivering
Top-Notch Revues with the Houston
Musical Theater Company

David Hock was born and grew up in Los Angeles. He began performing at camp during his early teens and later performed in his high school's shows, then at local community theaters and regional theaters. He was a theater major at UCLA and has been active in the professional theater world and the entertainment industry for more than 40 years.

In the early 80s, while Hock was still at UCLA, his father bought a famous niteclub in Los Angeles called The Horn. Performers like Carol Burnett, Jack Jones, Vicki Carr, and Jay Johnson all began their careers at The Horn. Hock served as the Entertainment Director for the club and the connections and relationships that Hock formed at such an early age with performers, agents, managers, and producers during those years were invaluable to him and carried him through many projects in the television, film, and theater industries. From working with Joan Rivers in the days she

was doing the Tonight Show, to meeting Johnny Carson, Jackie Mason, Carl Reiner, Mel Brooks, Milton Berle, Steve Allen, Jay Johnson, Billy Davis and Marilyn McCoo of The 5th Dimension, Jay Leno and Brad Garrett—the list is long and impressive.

Early on in his career, Hock transitioned from tap dancing and performing to producing, directing and choreographing. He realized that he wasn't the most talented, but instead could see the bigger picture—a talent that most performers don't have. While their talents rested on evolving their craft and developing their performance skills, Hock's talent was in meshing all that talent together.

Early on, Hock helped produce a revue at The Horn, Seymour Glick is Alice but Sick, written and co-directed by Steve Allan, and produced a tour of a one woman show called Musical Feat that





he also co-directed and co-choreographed with four-time Tony-Award winning director and choreographer Thommie Walsh. Over the years, Hock has founded regional theater companies in Los Angeles, Las Vegas, San Francisco and Phoenix. During his time in San Francisco, he directed and produced *Pippin*, which starred the legendary Nanette Fabray and Morgan Brittany from the television show *Dallas*. Hock moved to Phoenix in 2001 during the week of 9/11 and in 2010 opened Scottsdale Musical Theater Company where he produced many shows for the next ten years at the state-of-the-art 650 seat Tempe Center for the Arts. There, he produced Annie starring Bronson Pinchot (TVs Perfect Strangers and the Beverly Hills Copmovies) and Broadway star Kaitlin Hopkins; 42nd Street with Emmy award winner Charles Shaughnessy (TVs The Nanny), Grammy winner Debby Boone and Broad-

way dance sensation Eloise Kropp; Thoroughly Modern Millie with Dawnn Lewis (TVs A Different World and Major Crimes); A Christmas Carol again with Charles Shaughnessy, and prior to the pandemic, Man of La Mancha, which starred the late Peter Scolari (TVs Bosom Buddies, The Bob Newhart Show, Girls, Gotham, Evil, Honey I Shrunk

the Kids). One of the impressive aspects of Hock's shows was his use of a 25 piece live orchestra for every show SMTC presented.

His production of 42nd Street at the SMTC was a crowning achievement. Utilizing the national tour set, a repertoire of over 300 costumes and the dazzling choreography by Eloise Kropp, 42nd Street reached the pinnacle of musical theater production. Annie and Thoroughly Modern Millie were also special achievements for the Hock.

"Working with all of these television, film and broadway stars has truly been the experience of a lifetime," he says.

But just as memorable was his 2017 production of *West Side Story* before he began casting the celebrity guest stars.

"The audience doesn't realize how difficult and emotional West Side Story is to perform," says Hock. "The massive touring set and the intensity of the racial storylines given what was happening in the news with the anti-immigrant policies made the show so impactful. Performers were so emotionally drained that the tears at the end of the show when Tony gets shot and killed were real."

Another production that can't be left out of Hock's list of greatest

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achievements is his 2019 production of Man of La Mancha with Peter Scolari, who was known for his comedic roles on TV. A few months after the production, in the spring of 2020, Hock learned from Peter that he was diagnosed with esophageal cancer and had the tumor in his throat while performing in Man of La Mancha. Peter Scolari sadly passed away in 2021, with his performance of Don Quixote being the last onstage role he performed.

"He was the most introspective and moving Don Quixote you could imagine," says Hock. "His performance, as an actor, of that role was riveting every night for both cast and audience."

When the pandemic put a pause on theater in 2020, Hock was presented with an opportunity to produce a documentary for NASA on space health that brought him to Houston the following year. It was a turn in life that never would have happened without the pandemic.

surviving in space. Hock and Shaughnessy are also planning to reboot their series once the industry gets past the situation of the current labor strikes.

Upon his arrival in Houston in 2021, Hock started the Houston Musical Theater Company doing intimate cabaret-style revues. HMTC's focus is in doing musical revues at smaller venues for charity events, retirement communities, fundraisers, private and





corporate events, and at churches and temples. HMTC offers a number of revues that run the gambit of musical theater styles from Broadway showstoppers, to Irving Berlin, Rodgers & Hammerstein, Andrew Lloyd Webber and Stephen Sondheim, all delivered by top-knotch professional performers with incredible vocal talent.

"I've been lucky to have found phenomenal singers that truly enjoy singing such a broad range of musical theater repertoire," says Hock.

"Our audiences get to hear Broadway music as it was originally intended to be heard."

Since his work with Charles Shaughnessy for 42nd Street in 2018, Hock and Shaughnessy have become good friends and created a production company together, Dynamic Digital Content Worldwide. They developed LA Mix, an episodic TV series about a diverse group of people living in L.A. Although the show's production was halted by the pandemic, their production company is still active and carried forward with the space health documentary for NASA. Hock created a shorter version of the documentary that will have distribution in 2023 and is in the pre-production stages for a limited docuseries that will expand on the topic of


